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TIE DYE

Chemistry Meets Art and Fashion

Ms. Sciusco, Bilingual Teaching Assistant and Ms. Ihuoma, Science Teacher, created a tie dye experiment in their classroom to celebrate world chemistry day. This chemistry project was amazing. All of the students were eager to participate. The project was completed mainly by sophomores at Irvington High School. The class was discussing chemical reactions as a way to bring chemistry alive they tie dyed shirts. Initially, the students teamed up with another class to watch a video on chemical reactions and then the teachers followed through with the experiment.

Tie dye coloring works due to a special type of chemical reaction between an acid and a base. Upon the completion of the experiment, the students now have new dyed clothing by chemically bonding dye molecules with the clothing fabric molecules. We had two types of examples, polyester and cotton. As the students experimented they realized that polyester can be tie dyed, but it does not absorb color nearly as well as cotton. Because of this, creating vibrant tie dye color combos is nearly impossible on polyester. The classroom was filled with laughter and educational conversations. What a wonderful experience for the students involved.
